Alexandrite is a rare variety of the mineral chrysoberyl known for its ability to change color in different light sources. It was named after Emperor Alexander II of Russia where it was first discovered in 1830. In its finest quality, alexandrite will change from green in daylight to red in incandescent light. Significant sources of alexandrite include Brazil, Sri Lanka, and Madagascar.
